Richland jobless rate falls slightly

Richland Parish's unemployment dropped slightly in November according to the latest figures released by the Louisiana Works Commission.

Richland Parish's jobless rate dropped from 4.1 percent in October to 3.8 percent in November. This is also down from 6.3 percent a year ago.

This means 308 people were seeking work in Richland Parish in November, down from 330 in October and 510 in November 2020.

A total of 7,735 people were employed in the parish in November, down from 7,818 in October but up from 7,619 a year ago.

LaSalle Parish had the state's lowest unemployment in November with 2.3 percent. East Carroll Parish had the state's highest jobless rate at 7.5 percent.

On the statewide level, Louisiana's jobless rate fell from 5.4 in October to 5.1 in November, down from 7.9 a year ago. The national rate fell from 4.6 to 4.2 for the same period, down from 6.7 a year ago.

In Louisiana, total nonfarm employment (1,865,300 jobs) added 8,500 jobs over the month and added 34,600 jobs over the year.

Volt discusses plans for Internet service

Volt Broadband, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Winnsboro-based Northeast Louisiana Power Cooperative, plans to build out a fiber optic internet network for their customers residing and working in NELPCO's sev-

en-parish territory footprint. "We are pleased to be able to bring this to the customers we already serve through the power cooperative," said NELPCO and Volt Broadband General Manager Jeff Churchwell at a launch meeting held Jan. 11 at the company's office in Rayville. "Moving forward with this broadband initiative was approved by the cooperative board in June of last year, and we've been working toward this since that time."

"As you can imagine, this is certainly not a simple process and, as with any project of this type, there are many legal and political roads we must travel down before construction starts," he said. "This process is on-going and we are anxious to begin construction and launch this service for our membership."

A number of elected officials from throughout NELPCO's footprint were in attendance at the kickoff meeting, including numerous state senators and representatives, along with parish law enforcement and local government officials, cooperative board members, and interested citizens.

Public Service Commissioner Foster Campbell and Veneeth Iyengar with the governor's office were also in attendance.

"You all know I'm a lifelong Democrat," said Commissioner Campbell to the many elected officials in attendance at the meeting. "But, this is not a Democrat or Republican project, this is a people deal. This is far bigger than our politics because it's about helping people get educated and businesses get connected."

"There's no wrong way to do the right thing, and this is the right thing for the people

of northeast Louisiana," he added.

In addition, Jonathan Chambers of Conexon was on hand to discuss his company's involvement in the upcoming project. The company will be working with Volt Broadband to construct the network which will utilize the NELPCO power grid infrastructure. Chambers, a partner at Conexon based in Kansas City, MO, has worked for over thirty years at start-up telecommunications companies, as well as in government with the FCC. For the majority of his career, Chambers has worked with scores of electric cooperatives building broadband networks to bring fiber-to-the-home band to the customers they serve. "We're very pleased to be a part of this project," he told those in attendance. "The Volt Broadband initiative is different from any other broadband project in the state of Louisiana. Volt is wholly owned by the Northeast Louisiana Power Cooperative and, because of that, they will follow the longestablished cooperative principles that have been successfully followed since they first brought electricity to the

rural areas many years ago." "At Conexon, we'll follow those same principles as we move forward in this project, meaning we will build the same high quality network to every single cooperative member, and we will do so quickly."

Chambers said once actual construction work begins,

it will move at a fast pace. "We plan to build this network over the course of the next two years," Chambers told those assembled at the meeting. "In just two years, one hundred percent of the members of Northeast Louisiana Power Cooperative will have access to the best levels of internet service available anywhere in the country, right here in rural northeast Louisiana, and the services will be very affordable."
